Jam Session: The Ishibashi Foundation Collection×Tomoko Konoike Tomoko Konoike: FLIP

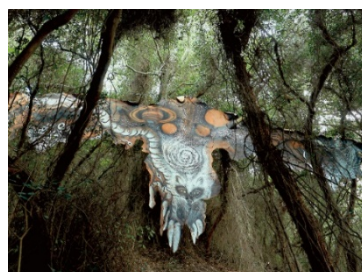
The Artizon Museum of the Ishibashi Foundation (Director : Ishibashi Hiroshi) is delighted to announce that Jam Sessions are annual joint showings of works from the Ishibashi Foundation Collection and works by contemporary artists. The Jam Sessions are a new, adventurous challenge for the museum.

For the first in this series we welcome Tomoko Konoike, whose work transcends the conventional approaches of painting and sculpture, using as her media travel (which combines time and motion), song and narrative (which are verbal languages), toys and handicrafts--the familiar actions and means of daily life. In these works she reconsiders the primal form of human culture, hunting and gathering, continuing her fundamental questioning of art.

Konoike, in preparation for this exhibition, has repeatedly engaged in dialogs with many of the elements that have shaped the Artizon Museum. She visited the Bridgestone's tire factory in Kyushu and its technical center in Tokyo and interviewed the Museum's director and others involved. She also listened to lectures about the collection by the Museum's curators and carefully explored the framework that guided creation of museums during the modern period, searching for new possibilities.

The result of this process is an installation with a round large *fusuma-e* (sliding-door painting) as its center, that reaches across the entire gallery. Encountering this work through all five senses subtly reorients--flips--the visitor's point of view..

As animals, each human being grasps the world with totally different perceptions. We see the world through our own *umwelts*. None are the same. No words are identical. No light is identical. If the arts prepare themselves for that and address it honestly, then in time a new ecosystem, filled with the senses, for a small organism, will begin to function. Instead of substituting illusions for words, let us feel our way to the small things we encounter daily, play, and quietly do our work. (Konoike)

The Ishibashi Foundation Collection

The Ishibashi Foundation Collection began as the personal collection of Ishibashi Shojiro, its founder, and is now owned by the Ishibashi Foundation, which continues those collecting activities. Presently consisting of about 2,800 works, the collection spans Western paintings, modern Japanese-style paintings, sculpture and ceramics from East and West, and Chinese and Japanese calligraphy and paintings, as well twentieth century and contemporary art.

Jam Sessions

The Jam Sessions embody “Experiencing Creativity,” the concept guiding the Artizon Museum, which reopened in a new form in January 2020. For Jam Sessions, artists and curators working together organize exhibitions with new works inspired by specific works in the Ishibashi Foundation Collection and sessions in which the collection and the artist’s works interact to create new points of view. Our goal is a project that will be a bridge past and present and lead on to the future. The museum plans to hold a Jam Session every year.

Highlights

(1) An installation newly created for this exhibition

The central work is the newly created large *fusuma-e* (sliding-door painting). A unique slope was been made to surround it. Around it are shadowgraph hanging paper lanterns, symbolizing mandalas, and in the artist’s voice, sounds of creatures other than human beings--wolves, winds, snow maidens--reverberate. By shifting perspectives, it creates new experiences, new ways to appreciate the world. This is Konoike’s first major solo exhibition in Tokyo in eleven years, since her 2009 *Inter-Traveler* exhibition at the Tokyo Opera City Art Gallery.

(2) A session with the artist and the Ishibashi Foundation Collection

Leather Kite, a work twelve meters wide and four meters tall, was shown at the Setouchi International Art Festival 2019, where it was installed on a hill for a year and then brought to this exhibition, where it shows the changes it has undergone over time. Beside it, works from our collection, including Gustave COURBET’s *Deer Running in the Snow* and Alfred SISLEY’s *Women Going to the Woods*, are placed to engage in conversation with it. A wild ambience fills the gallery.

(3) Looking with newborn eyes: The birth of seeing

Between each gallery, bear and wolf skins, wood, vinyl, ceramics, yarn, and other materials hang down, creating paths through a forest. As we wend our way through them, sensesdormant within us are aroused, and a newborn, primitive body opens its eyes. The full body experience--not just vision, but touch, smell, and hearing--Konoike has named “the birth of seeing.” It is the genesis of savoring the surprises and richness of as-yet-unknown experiences.



Tomoko Konoike Biography

Born in Akita in 1960. Recent solo exhibitions include, *Primordial Violence*, 2015-17, in Kanagawa Kenmin Hall, the Museum of Modern Art, Gunma, and the Niigata Bandaijima Art Museum (awarded the 2016 Ministry of Education's Art Encouragement Prize); *Fur Story*, 2018, Leeds Arts University (UK); and *Hunter Gatherer*, 2018, Akita Museum of Modern Art. Group exhibitions include *Temporal Turn*, 2016, Spencer Museum, University of Kansas, USA; *Nous*, 2016, 21st Century Museum of Contemporary Art, Kanazawa; *Japan—Spirits of Nature*, 2017 Nordiska Akvarellmuseet (Sweden); and the Setouchi International Art Festival 2019. Writings include *Animal Language* and the picture book *Book Burning World of Wonder* (both published by Hatori Shoten).

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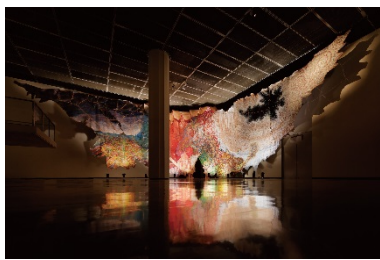
Access

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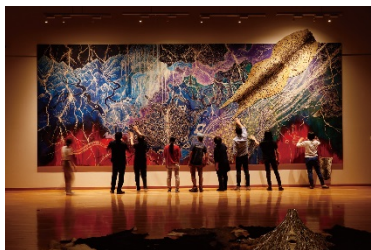
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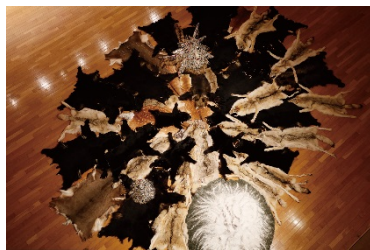

Designated entry system by date and time

The designated entry system by date and time is designed so that visitors may enjoy a more comfortable viewing experience. Please purchase your tickets for an entry time slot for the day you will visit, as shown below, and make sure you enter the museum within that time slot.

①10:00–11:30 ②12:00–13:30 ③14:00–15:30 ④16:00–17:30

- You may enter at any time within the designated time slot.
- Once you enter the museum, your ticket is valid for the rest of the day; you may stay and enjoy the exhibition until the museum closes.
- At the start of each entry time slot, the museum may be crowded. You may be asked to wait before entering the museum. We recommend arriving for entry slightly after the start of your time slot.

On-line designated entry time ticket purchase

- Tickets go on sale February 18, 2020 (Tuesday)
Tickets must be purchased from the museum website (www.artizon.museum) by clicking on the Ticketing link and selecting the date and time slot when you wish to enter.
- Tickets must be purchased up to 10 minutes before the end of each time slot.
- Major credit cards are accepted for payment.

Delivery of on-line designated entry time ticket and entry to the museum

After you have purchased your ticket, an E-mail will be sent to your designated E-mail address. Please access the QR code and download it onto your smartphone. You can also print out the QR code and bring the paper with the print out with you when you visit the museum.

Same day ticket sales

Tickets are available only for time slots that have not reached full capacity; they can be purchased on 1F of the museum.

Advanced booking

- Entry is free for university and college students and high school students, but advanced booking of the entry time slot is required. Each student must present a student ID upon entrance to the museum.
- Children through junior high school age are admitted for free. No advanced booking is required.

- Entry is free for disabled visitors (plus one accompanying assistant), but advanced booking of the entry time slot is required. Disabled visitors must present their disabled persons handbook upon entrance to the museum.

Group Entry to the museum

For groups of 10 or more children through junior high school age, entry requires prior notification using the E-mail address below. If no notification is received, those groups may not be admitted to the museum if the galleries are crowded.
