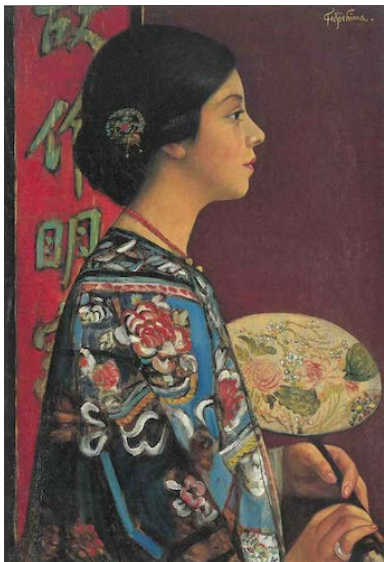

Two years have passed since the launch of the Artizon Museum in 2020, and this year, we celebrate the seventieth anniversary of the founding of our predecessor, the Bridgestone Museum of Art. The Ishibashi Foundation collection began as the personal collection of our founder, Ishibashi Shojiro and was later donated to the foundation, which continues to broaden and deepen it. This exhibition presents the trajectory of the 70 years of the Artizon Museum since 1952, when the Bridgestone Museum of Art opened, through approximately 170 works of art and documentation, including ancient art, Western and modern Japanese art, Abstractionism, contemporary art, and Japanese and East Asian antique art. We also reflect on our history through posters for past exhibitions, records of the Saturday Lectures, which have been held since the museum opened, an art film series, Shojiro's journals of his travels in the West, and other archive materials.

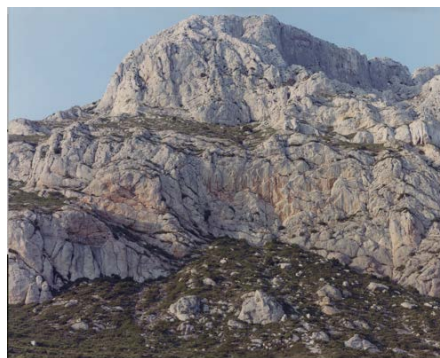

Photography was invented and was popularized in the nineteenth century. In painting, in the same period, the Impressionists were a starting point in a series of major changes from what had been traditional painting styles. Photography played at least a slight role in motivating those changes. Moreover, the photograph, from its birth in the mid nineteenth century, has sought to be treated as a work of art, with a painterly style, rather than a mere documentary record. That art photography mindset lives on today. The photographic works by Shibata Toshio and Suzuki Risaku, two contemporary artists, share a creative concept with modern art: expressing the human view of objects. This Jam Session thus pairs them with work by Paul Cézanne, whom they had been interested in since the very beginning of their careers, to explore the relationship between contemporary photography and painting.

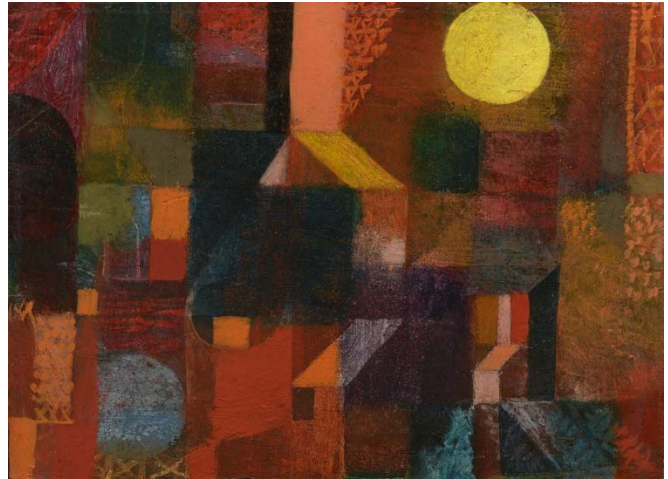

Modern art as we know it began with Manet and the Impressionists in the latter half of the nineteenth century has been colored by the emergence of avant-garde movements, one after another. The background to those developments includes the advancing internationalization of the art world. Art-related people, works, and information travel and flow across national borders and continents. How, in that context, do artists decide the aims of their own art and create it? This exhibition surveys European, Japanese, and American art from the mid-nineteenth century to the end of World War II, focusing on Pierre-Auguste Renoir, Fujishima Takeji, Paul Klee, and Zao Wou-Ki. It spotlights how artists opened up new creative terrains through the transformations they achieved in their own art resulting from contacts and conversations with different, even alien, presences.

Two Journeys: Aoki Shigeru and Sakamoto Hanjiro

Commemorating the 140th Anniversary of Their Births

Aoki Shigeru and Sakamoto Hanjiro sought their own styles amidst the period when Western-style painting was beginning to mature in Japan. Aoki attracted public attention from his youth, and his masterpiece, *A Gift of the Sea* (1904) has been positioned as an exemplar of Meiji Romanticism. Despite his stellar debut, he spent his last years wandering about Kyushu; his short life ended without his being able to return the central art world. Sakamoto was invited to Tokyo by Aoki and debuted there a few later years later than his friend; he later studied abroad. During his long life—Sakamoto lived to the age of 87—he applied himself steadily to his work, addressing many subjects, including horses, still lifes, and the moon and building a tranquil world view. Aoki and Sakamoto worked in different styles and had different personalities, but they encouraged each other in their work. This exhibition introduces both artists' oeuvre and points at which their lives intersected.

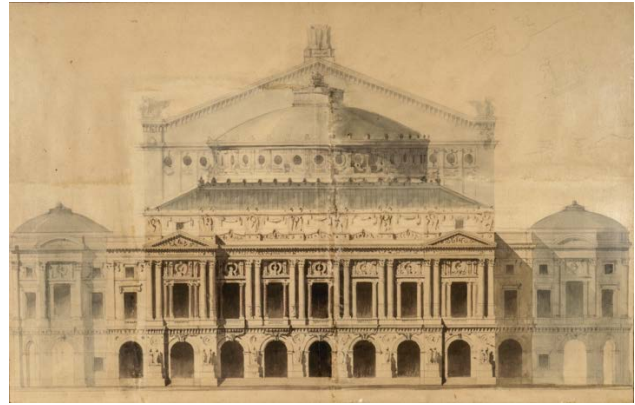

Dialogues of the Muses: The Paris Opera House and the Arts

The Paris Opera House is known as a glorious sacred space for ballet and opera performances. This exhibition explores the history of the Paris Opera House from the seventeenth century to the present, examining the relationships between various fields of art and their appeal from a total art perspective. The focus is particularly on the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries, the age of romantic ballet, grand opera, and the Ballets Russes. Introducing the multifaceted appeal of the Paris Opera House from artistic, cultural, and sociological perspectives, using works from the Bibliothèque nationale de France and other sources in Japan and abroad, this exhibition reveals its historic significance. In making the many connections between the opera house and the various arts, this exhibition is an utterly unprecedented venture.

The Ishibashi Foundation collection now consists of approximately 2,800 works, including Impressionist paintings from the latter half of the nineteenth century, modern painting from the twentieth century, modern Japanese paintings from the Meiji period on, postwar Abstract paintings, early modern and modern art from Japan and elsewhere in East Asia, and ancient Greek and Roman art. Here we introduce, throughout the year, a variety of works selected from the collection.
