Brancusi: Carving the Essence

March 30 [Sat] - July 7 [Sun], 2024

The Artizon Museum, Ishibashi Foundation (Director: Ishibashi Hiroshi), presents *Brancusi: Carving the Essence*.

The sculptor Constantin Brancusi (1876-1957), who was born in Romania, is known as a pioneering artist who, through his exploration of pure form, carved out new territory in twentieth-century sculpture, post Rodin. This exhibition makes his sculptures its core in weaving together, through his two-dimensional works such as fresco, tempera, drawing, and photographs, showcasing the totality of Brancusi's artistic activities. It is the first exhibition at an art museum in Japan to present Brancusi comprehensively. About ninety exhibits include over twenty sculptures on loan from the Brancusi Estate in Paris and museums and other collections in Japan and abroad, plus paintings, and photography.

Constantin Brancusi



Born in Hobita, Romania, Brancusi studied at the Bucharest School of Fine Arts, then moved to Paris in 1904. While invited to work as an assistant in Rodin's studio, he held that position only briefly before leaving to engage in his own work. His sculptures have wild shapes influenced by the forms of non-western art such as African Sculpture discovered at the same period, while he sought elegant forms backed by his acute sense of his materials. Brancusi is known for the enormous influence he had on his contemporaries and artists of later generations.

Exhibition Highlights

1. The First Brancusi Exhibition at an Art Museum in Japan

While Brancusi is famed as a leading twentieth-century sculptor, until now no museum in Japan has held a major exhibition focusing primarily on his sculptural works. This exhibition is the first opportunity to experience his creations themselves.

2. A Gathering of over Twenty Sculptures, from Japan and Abroad, Covering His Early to Later Periods



This exhibition presents work by Brancusi from his early period, when he retained the influence of academic realism and Rodin, to the 1910s, when he reduced the forms of his subjects to their essence, and then the period from 1920 on when he made his subjects increasingly abstract, as in *Bird*. The exhibition thus achieves a thorough presentation from which we can glimpse Brancusi's path as a sculptor.

3) Presenting his Multifaceted Aspects as a Creator



This exhibition also introduces paintings and photographs by Brancusi. While he consistently made sculpture the core of his creative work, his approach of exploring crosscutting fields, using other techniques in relation to his sculpture, is quintessentially modern. His acute awareness of the nature of his materials, evident in his sculptures, is also highly craftsmanlike. This exhibition highlights his many aspects as a creator.

Selections from the Ishibashi Foundation Collections

The Ishibashi Foundation Collection now consists of approximately 3,000 works, including Impressionist paintings from the latter half of the nineteenth century, modern paintings from the twentieth century, modern Japanese paintings from the Meiji period on, postwar Abstract

paintings, early modern art from Japan and elsewhere in East Asia, and ancient Greek and Roman art. Here we introduce works selected from the collection at 5 and 4F Galleries.

Special Section SHIMIZU Takashi (4F Gallery)



Shimizu Takashi (1897-1981), Japan's leading modern sculptor, originally wanted to be a painter. While studying abroad in France, he was awakened to the possibilities of sculpture by encountering Bourdelle's work. He also continues to paint and was quite successful in both fields, becoming, for example, the first Japanese artist to have both paintings and sculptures accepted for the Salon d'automne. This exhibition is focused on seventeen new acquisitions in highlighting Shimizu's paintings from his time in Europe.
